“ROCKING UP FOR ROCKWARBLERS”

Volunteers are needed to search for Rockwarblers at target sites in eastern NSW during this autumn and to enter their sightings into Birddata. The overall detection rate of Rockwarblers at sites where they were known to occur before the fires has been low — only 10 percent of sites and 7 percent of surveys recorded Rockwarblers. Most of these sites were on the periphery of the wilderness area, and half the sites surveyed were in unburnt habitat. With so few detections, there is no clear pattern. Repeating surveys at these sites is vital to better understand the factors that affect Rockwarblers' detectability and distribution. BIRDLIFE SHOALHAVEN'S STUDENT RESEARCH GRANT PROGRAM

BirdLife Shoalhaven (BLS) will provide a grant of up to \$4,000 to fund a research project in 2023, that will improve bird conservation and/or a better understanding of birds in the Shoalhaven. To be eligible you must be a student currently enrolled in a higher degree course at an NSW or ACT university.

While it is not a requirement, projects focused on threatened species or with field work carried out within the Shoalhaven, will be highly regarded. The grant must be used to directly support the project or its dissemination, for example on-ground bird conservation work, education programs or materials, project equipment and materials, or travel to relevant conferences. The successful applicant will be required to give a presentation on their project at a BLS event or other conference and submit an article in a future BLS Magazine.

CONSERVATION NEWS FROM BIRDLIFE AUSTRALIA AND ELSEWHERE

1. Despite challenging conditions, thousands of waterbirds are breeding throughout NSW wetlands. Recent flooding and water flow management in previous years have led to vast numbers of waterbirds, including large nesting colonies of Straw-necked Ibis and Royal Spoonbill, breeding at wetlands throughout the Northern and Central Murray Darling Basin. Although several waterbird species require flooding to breed, the recent extreme floods, that are impacting humans and animals alike, saw large areas of nesting colonies in the MDB go underwater. Researchers from the UNSW Sydney Centre for Ecosystem Science (UNSW-CES), however, have confirmed that many chicks managed to survive at the Booligal and Gayini wetlands in Southern NSW and the Narran Lake and Gwydir wetlands in Northern NSW, with some already taking flight. The Gayini Wetlands, an area of significant conservation importance, is a roughly 88,000-hectare property in the Lowbidgee Floodplain, the largest remaining area of wetlands in the Murrumbidgee in the southern Murray-Darling Basin. The property is owned and managed by the Traditional Custodians of the land, the Nari Nari Tribal Council. Gayini, the Nari Nari word for water, is one of the largest wetland restoration projects in Australia and features a mix of environmental and Indigenous conservation and sustainable farming. The number of birds observed at Gayini include: 10-15,000 breeding pairs of Straw-necked Ibis; 300 breeding pairs of Royal Spoonbill; and 3500 breeding pairs of Pelicans.

2. 2022 NSW Regent Honeyeater Captive Release Community Update #4– 31st January 2023

In late-December and into January, most birds continued to congregate in two main “hot spots” – each of which still supporting large numbers of Musk Lorikeets also taking advantage of available blossom. Having birds remain loyal to these defined areas has allowed the team to have a greater focus on observing the behaviours and interactions among particular birds. The southern hotspot features several species of eucalypts where the birds typically fed in the morning, and a nearby open area dominated by Black Wattle where they hawked and gorged on invertebrates later in the day. The second hotspot, located 500 metres north along a creek line, had a variety of flowering eucalypts, Black Wattle, and small waterholes. Alas there is still no successful nesting activity.

3. The Victorian Government has decided to allow duck shooting in Victoria this season though

the season has been shortened to four weeks. Birdlife Australia notes that despite three years with more rain, our declining populations of ducks and other waterbirds have not yet recovered after years of prolonged and widespread drought. Long-term monitoring shows that the bounce-back in waterbird numbers has not been as high as would normally be expected and that several good seasons are needed to replenish the losses that have occurred. Ducks need this season to build up numbers, as will the many non-target waterbirds species that will be disturbed or in the line of fire of the shooters' guns.

4. The NSW government announced last year it had approved the Cumberland Plain conservation plan (CPCP), a [major planning policy](#) that will guide the development of four new urban growth areas and up to 73,000 houses from Penrith to Wilton over 35 years. To compensate for the destruction of koala habitat and some of Sydney's rarest bushland, the state has committed to environmental offsets, including a new Georges River koala reserve in the local government areas of Campbelltown and Wollondilly. The proposed reserve would be up to 1,830 hectares. The NSW government plans to establish conservation agreements on much of this land in order to generate biodiversity offset credits. The government would then buy those credits using levies paid by developers to fund the new reserve's ongoing management. But, as the CPCP itself states, most of this future reserve was already in state government ownership. National Parks Association of NSW president Grahame Douglas considers that this is another example of what is referred to as "double dipping" on offsets, where lands already intended for conservation are traded again for the same purpose and to facilitate more clearing. <https://www.theguardian.com/australia-news/2023/feb/23/just-a-disgrace-experts-condemn-nsw-use-of-public-land-to-offset-huge-housing-expansion>
